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Another Tourist Attraction Turns Its Back on Coaches

Birling Gap and the iconic Seven Sisters cliffs are among the South Coast's most popular beauty spots, attracting thousands of visitors every year. But once again, the coach industry is being pushed aside.

We have been informed that coach parking and coach dropoff are no longer permitted within the car park at Birling Gap, located in East Dean near Eastbourne, East Sussex. This decision significantly impacts group travel access to the site and is yet another example of a tourist destination making it harder for coach passengers to enjoy what the UK has to offer.

While alternative parking is available in Eastbourne, it's far from ideal. Free all-day coach parking is offered at College Road, and paid parking (up to four hours) is available on King Edwards Parade, with limited drop-off options in surrounding roads.

The National Trust website suggests that regular buses between Eastbourne and Brighton stop at East Dean, but this is 1.5 miles away and the most direct route along Birling Gap Road has no pavements or walkways, making it impractical and unsafe for visitors with accessibility needs.

The UKCOA will be challenging this decision with the National Trust and pressing them to reconsider their stance. If you've encountered similar exclusions elsewhere, please let us know so we can strengthen our case for improved coach access to key visitor destinations.

- **Check**: Assessing whether a situation is genuinely suspicious.
- Notify: Reporting concerns promptly to the appropriate authorities or security.



Coach depots and bus stations are high-traffic environments, making them potential targets for unauthorised access or suspicious activity. The NPSA provides detailed advice on measures such as access control, staff awareness training, and reporting protocols to help businesses reduce risks.

Drivers and crew also play a crucial role in ensuring security while on the road. The NPSA also offer guidance on recognising and responding to suspicious behaviour, monitoring unattended items, and reporting concerns effectively. Reviewing these resources and incorporating their best practices can help operators take a proactive stance against potential threats.
